KINDERGARTEN NEWS

Families:

We are winding down our year and have so much fun stuff planned! We are currently having our kindergarten ABC countdown. Each day we do an activity centered around that letter of the day. The kids are having a blast reviewing all of the letters they have learned. We are also practicing for our Kinder Celebration Program that will be on May 18th at 5:30. The kids are very excited to perform for their loved ones. Not only are we doing these fun things but we are still working on our math and reading skills. We are working on our fluency in reading and not reading like a 'robot'. Students are also working very hard on their math fluency in addition and subtraction. Please keep working with your students, they have grown so much and are ready to make the journey to First Grade!!

1st GRADE NEWS

In Math, students will continue adding 2-digit numbers and review skills they have learned throughout the year. In Fundations, they will be learning multisyllabic words and adding suffixes -s,-es, -ing, and -ed. Please continue to read fluency passages and nonsense words daily to prepare for the final DIBELS assessment for First Grade.

First Graders, we are so very proud of you and all of your hard work. You have learned so many new skills and concepts. We have truly enjoyed our year with you, watching you grow, and learn. Please remember to practice reading, writing, and math facts over the summer. You are all very special and we will miss you greatly! We hope you have a fun filled and safe summer! Be sure to come back and visit us next year.

2nd GRADE NEWS

Wow. Can you believe May is already here? Time has flown by with our amazing bunch of 2nd graders this year! In reading this month, we will focus on locating information and proving our answers using proof from the text, in both narrative and informational texts. In writing, we will complete our autobiographies, write a biography about a friend, and then write a comparison piece between the two. It will be both challenging and fun! In math we will practice our addition and subtraction with regrouping skills using numbers up to 1,000. Then we will finish the year with measurement word problems. In science, we will complete our weather unit and learn all about how and why weather happens. We will focus on the water cycle, clouds, precipitation, wind, thunder and lightning, and rainbows. Remember, our reading goal is 87 words per minute. Keep practicing those fluency activities at home each night. We are so close to meeting our goal!

<u>3rd Grade</u>

In reading this month, our stories will feature different habitats. We will read both fiction and nonfiction texts as we learn more about habitats. Students will be writing a report about an animal that they have selected, and they will be presenting their report in class. In math, we are reviewing word problems and two-step problems. Word problems are very difficult, so make sure that you are offering extra support as your child completes his/her homework. As the school year draws to a close, we just want to thank all of the parents for the support that we have received during the year. We have loved working with your children and have enjoyed the year that we spent teaching them. Please keep working with them over the summer and make sure that they continue to read every day!

Adventures with sidewalk chalk

Make your sidewalk a colorful canvas for your child's reading and writing adventures this summer. Here's how.

Hit the target

Your voungster will write and read words with this game. Help him draw a target and write one word in the bull's-eye, three words in the next circle, and five words in the outer circle. To play, stand a few feet away, and toss bean bags (or socks filled with dry beans) at the words. If you hit a word, read it aloud and erase it. Score 1 point for outer words, 5 points for ones in the middle ring, and 10 for the bull's eye word. Tally your scores. Then, write new words, and play again ...

Guess the sentence

Have your child stand at one end of the sidewalk with his back to you. Starting right behind him, write a sentence one word per sidewalk square. He walks or hops backward so he sees one word at a time and reads them aloud. Before he hops over the last word, ask him to guess what it will be. He'll practice using context

What's our word of the day?

Big words might sound scary to your youngster, but they don't have to. Demystify—there's a big word! them by starting a word-of-the-day ritual in your house.

Each day, someone posts a new word on the refrigerator. You might find words in a book, in the newspaper, or on a food package. Look for words that sound interesting or are fun to say, such as vibrant, astonishing, and mesmerized.

Together, look up the word and read its definition aloud. Then, use it all day long. By the end of the day, your child will have added another word to her vocabulary!



dues to figure out unknown words. Next, let him write a sentence for you.

Gather objects

This activity lets your youngster practice following written instructions. Draw a big triangle, and next to it, write what your child should put inside. For instance, you might write, "Find one short twig, one medium twig, and one long twig." He has to read the directions and put the correct objects in the triangle. Finally, ask him to draw a different shape and write instructions for you to follow.



Magazine word games

For quick ways to improve your child's vocabulary and spelling skills, look to further than your nearest stack of magazines! Play these games.

First and last. Call out two letters. Players take a megazine and race to locate a word that begins with one of the letters and ends.

with the other. For E and M, your youngster might find embient and mannalede.

The longest word. Ask your child to choose a letter. Then, each player opens a magazine to a random page and writes down the longest word he can find that starts with that letter. Read your words out loud. Let the winner pick a new letter, and play again.
