# **Bond Frequently Asked Questions**

The J.O. Combs Unified School District Governing Board has scheduled a special bond election for November 8, 2016 to address facility, transportation and technology needs. All registered voters living in the J.O. Combs School District boundaries are eligible to vote either through early ballots or voting at polling sites.

#### What is a bond?

A bond allows local voters to approve additional funding to use for capital items such as school buses, building repairs and renovations, new construction and technology. Bonds address the school district's capital needs.

#### Why is J.O. Combs requesting additional capital funds?

Over the past 7 years, J.O. Combs Unified School District has experienced a reduction of over \$7.6M in capital dollars. Because of the reduced state funding, school repairs have been deferred, older buses have remained in service, and technology has not been updated. Lack of acceptable facilities has impacted student programs and department efficiency. The increased capital funding will address the most immediate needs in these areas and will allow the district to plan for future growth.

#### How will the bond funds be spent?

The distribution of bond funds is as follows:

•	School and building renovations and improvements	\$6.6M
٠	Technology	\$5.5M
٠	Student transportation (buses)	\$3M
٠	Auditorium with classrooms and athletic storage facility	\$8.6M

٠	Maintenance, transportation, and district service facility	\$13.1M

#### What will be the cost of the proposed bond?

The estimated cost of the bond is \$7.23 per month on a \$100,000 home and would be funded by an estimated \$0.86 tax rate per \$100 of the net assessed valuation used for secondary property tax purpose.

#### How will the bond funds be distributed?

Funds raised through bonds go directly to the local school district, unlike state tax funds that are allocated to school districts throughout the state. Bonds offer local control to the community.

#### How can we be sure Combs will spend the money the way it was intended?

Each year, the school district administration proposes the annual budget, which is then reviewed, finalized, and approved by the community-elected governing board. The Combs District has received the Certificate of Excellence in Financial Reporting for the past six years.

#### After a more than five year absence, KidsCare is back!

KidsCare is Arizona's version of a federal health-insurance program for children and families who aren't eligible for Medicaid or AHCCCS, Arizona's affordable-health care program, or don't have access to employer-sponsored health insurance.

#### How does the program work?

Parents insuring their children in KidsCare pay a monthly premium depending on their household income.

 Monthly premiums can range from \$10 for one child in a household at the lower income range and up to \$70 for multiple children in households at the upper income range.

• The annual family income for a household of four at 133% FPL (Federal Poverty Level) is \$32,319 and at 200% FPL is \$48,600.

• KidsCare offers the full array of AHCCCS benefits. Eligible children will receive their coverage through health plans contracted with the AHCCCS Administration.

Families will have their eligibility conducted by the Department of Economic Security (DES) as part of a holistic eligibility determination.

# Reading...oh the places you'll go...

## Reading with fluency:

Children who do not read with fluency sound choppy and awkward. Those students may have difficulty with decoding skills or they may just need more practice with speed and smoothness in reading. Fluency is also important for motivation; children who find reading laborious tend not to want read! As readers head into upper elementary grades, fluency becomes increasingly important. The volume of reading required in the upper elementary years escalates dramatically. Students whose reading is slow or labored will have trouble meeting the reading demands of their grade level.

## What parents can do to help at home

Support and encourage your child. Realize that he or she is likely frustrated by reading.

Check with your child's teachers to find out their assessment of your child's word decoding skills.

If your child can decode words well, help him or her build speed and accuracy by:

Reading aloud and having your child match his voice to yours

Having your child practice reading the same list of words, phrase, or short passages several times

Reminding your child to pause between sentences and phrases

Read aloud to your child to provide an example of how fluent reading sounds.

Give your child books with predictable vocabulary and clear rhythmic patterns so the child can "hear" the sound of fluent reading as he or she reads the book aloud.

Use books on tapes; have the child follow along in the print copy.

**Beginning Orchestra Students:** are becoming more proficient at moving and holding their bows while learning to read music without having to write letter names over their notes. **Advanced Orchestra Students**: Are becoming more proficient at playing Dotted Quarter Note/Eighth Note (Hiccup) Rhythms, and Quarter Note/Two Eighth Notes (Shuffle) Rhythms. Many advanced songs require this ability, and so we are practicing scales and songs that include these rhythm patterns.
