## **KINDERGARTEN NEWS**

#### Families!

I hope you all had a great spring break! Here in Kinder-land we are hitting it strong! We will be focusing a lot on writing this quarter. The goal in kindergarten is to be able to create a detailed picture and a sentence to match. The picture will give details about the story that they are not yet able to write about. We will be starting our caterpillar butterfly lifecycle unit. We have live caterpillars and will be watching them turn into a chrysalis and butterfly. We will be releasing them after their metamorphosis into the school garden. Our language and math centers/activities will have a butterfly theme to them. This is one of the favorite units of the year (what am I saying... they are all favorites!) In math we are still working on number partners up to 10 and adding and subtracting in 10. Students are also practicing teen numbers as 10 and more. We review these foundational skills and present them in many ways to help build a strong foundation in number sense. Thank you for the continued support you constantly give to your kindergartner. It is deeply appreciated.

### **1st GRADE NEWS**

In April, our classes will be learning about objects/materials and recycling. In Math, students will learn to add 2-digit numbers. Students will be working on phrasing and reading with expression in Reading. In Fundations, they will be learning about long vowels sounds, compound words, concept of syllable in multisyllabic words, and syllable division rules. In May, The DIBELS benchmark test will be administered to our First Graders. The students' goal, for the Nonsense Fluency assessment, is to be able to read 58 correct letter sounds and 13 whole words in one minute. Their Oral Reading Fluency goal is to be able to read 47 or more words per minute. Please help your child practice meeting their goal by timing them daily on their homework reading passages.

## **2nd GRADE NEWS**

Second graders will have a blast in April! We will work on reading and understanding maps. Then we will create some maps of our bedroom, Arizona, and North America. In math, we will continue our unit on graphing, and get to survey, tally and graph questions asked to other students. In reading, we will practice locating narrative elements like characters, setting, and plot using thinking maps to show what we know. In writing, we will work on How-To paragraphs, and follow each other's directions to be sure nothing is left out. In Fundations, we will continue working on long vowel teams, and determining which spelling option to use when writing words. Students are making great growth in reading and math goals. Remember to practice fluency with your child every night. We are really focusing on it hard this last quarter, to be ready for 3rd grade!

# 3rd Grade

We have been busy reviewing and preparing for the AzMerit test. Testing will take place from March 27th through April 13th. During this time, please make sure that your child gets plenty of rest. They also need a good breakfast every morning so that they have energy to think. During the month of April, we will be learning about the westward movement and the emergence of the modern United States. This learning will take place during reading and social studies. In math we will continue to review everything that we have learned so far this year. We will also begin to focus on solving two-step word problems.

## 4th Grade

#### Hello Parents!

This month is a big month in school! Our students are taking the AzMERIT tests to show off how much they have learned this year. A few great test taking strategies are: get a good night sleep the night before, eat a good breakfast the morning of testing, and come to school ready for show off all that has been learned!

Field trip information- Field trip permission slips, and \$15, should be turned in this month for our trip to The Grand Canyon. Fourth grade will be having another parent meeting this month.

# 5TH GRADE

Dear Parents and Families,

April is here and it is the last quarter! This month is a very busy month for 5th grade. Students will be working on their state reports in class and at home. Please make sure to look regularly at the packet that came home as it contains important due dates and deadlines. All students have been given their assigned state and are no in the process of gathering information for the written report. This assignment will be worth a total of 400 points so please make sure students are staying on track with the assigned due dates.

This month we will be taking our AZ Merit test so please make sure students are getting good nights rests and a good hearty breakfast before school.

This quarter we are reading graphic novels in class and learning about the different components to a graphic novel. We are also learning about photo essays. At the very end of the quarter students will take all the information learned about these two subjects and create their own graphic novel about an assigned photo.

# 6th Grade

Hello parents and families! April is a busy month for sixth grade. First, we will be continuing our AZMerit testing the first Monday and Wednesday in April. To ensure your child's success on testing days, please make sure they come to school well-rested, on time, and having had a healthy breakfast. During April, we will also be working on our Country Report projects. Students will be conducting research, writing reports, and constructing tri-fold boards displaying an assigned country in the world. In order to complete this project, your child will need multicolored index cards and a cardboard tri-fold board. Please contact your child's teacher with specific questions on the report. Finally, throughout April we will be studying human anatomy in science, literary analysis in reading, and understandings of both negative numbers and statistics in math. Fourth quarter is such a busy and exciting time!



#### Standardized Tests

Choose to do Well

True or false: standardized tests are tough. The answer depends on how prepared your youngster is. Here are four ways to help him handle their test week.

- I Explain that the tests will show how much he has learned. Encourage him to try his best but don't put so much emphasis on them that he feels stressed.
- 2. Practice the test format, for example, your child might have to read a paragraph and answer questions. Using one of his textbooks have him look at the questions at the end of a section first and then read the passages.
- 3. Limit activities the night before tests. You may want to avoid having guests for dinner or skip his brother's baseball game, if it means being out late. Be sure your child gets to bed on time and sets an alarm for the next morning..
- On the test day, give him an energy-boosting breakfast. Try to include both protein (eggs, yogurt, milk) and carbohydrates (oatmeal, toast).

#### Picture This

#### Short Notes about Reading

- Picture This: Good readers form mental pictures as they read, to improve your child's comprehension, read a book without letting him see it. Then, ask him to guess what the illustrations look like. Examples, how are the characters dressed? Is the setting bright or gloomy.
- 2. Who's Point of View: a story can certainly change depending on who's telling it. Let your child see that firsthand as he explores point of view in his writing. Try this: Have him write about a family outing from different people's viewpoints. fro each narrator, he should think about how that person's experiences and personality would shape the story. For example, How might his baby sister describe her first picnic? ("Mommy is always telling me not to throw food on the floor, but today we actually ate on the ground"!) His dad may have seen it differently. (?Our picnic was nice, but the softball game afterward, was the best part".



#### Read Aloud Favorites For (K-2nd Grades)

- It The Fenney Foul Up Who took star player Big. D's lucky bat? Mike and Casey are watching the boston Redsox practice when a mystery unfolds. Now the two nine year olds must find the bat to help their team win the game. The first book in David A. Kelly's Ballpark Mystery series.
- \* Hippose Can't Swim Hippose bodies are too dense to float but sea turtles can swim as fast as 35 miles per hour, this nortiction book by Laura Lyn DiSiena and Hannah Eliot includes fascinating facts about various animals, such as racoons, kangaroos, and great blue herons/
- \* Ladybug Girl and the Bug Squad When Lulu wears her ladybug costume, she becomes a superhero-Ladybug Girl! Her latest "mission" is to apologize for hurting her friend's feelings during a playdate. Part of the Ladybug Girl series by David Soman and Jocky Davis. (Also available in Spanish)
- ★ More Than Moccasins The hands-on activities in Laurie Carlson's book introduce your child to different aspects of Native American cultures. He can learn to make simple toys and crafts, play traditional games, and communicating using codes, each set of instructions includes tidbits about Native american history.

#### Book Picks for Intermediate Grades

- \* Ramona Quimby -Age 8- Ramona faces new challenges as she enters third grade. If starting a new school isn't enough, there's also the eraser-stealing bully, an egg that' suppose to be bailed (but isn't), and her best friend's difficult little sister. Part of the Ramona series by Beverly cleary. ( Also available in Spanish)
- \* Music Investigate the Evolution of American Sound How have history and technology influenced music? Author Donna Latham explores the history of music in America, from patriotic tunes and folk songs to hip-hop and rock in roll. This nonfiction book also gets into the science of sound- and encourages readers to make their own music.
- \* Locamotion Jocqueline Woodson's novel is written as a series of poems by 11 year old Lonnie Motion.
  (hicknamed "Locamotion"), who lost his parents in a fire. Inspired by a school writing assignment, Lonnie fids poetry a good way to express his feelings and cope with changes in his life.
- How to Speak Dog.How to Speak Cat Can your children tell what their dogs or cats are thinking? Sarah Whitehead's nonfiction books help them understand toil-wagging, purrs, and other behaviors, also includes games to play with pets, training tips, and pet care facts.

### Taking About Books

Many books written for children are enjoyable for adults, too. Try reading the same book your youngster is reading, and use these tips to discuss it, your child will build reading comprehension—and he'll be glad to have you for a reading pal.

- Share a memory— What did the book make you think of? Perhaps the main character reminded your
  youngster of a friend, or maybe the setting is similar to a place you use to live.
- 2. Discuss the author- Did you and your child like the writing style? Read the "About the Author" page, and talk about how the writer's life may have influenced the book.
- Invent your own ending—Take turns sharing your ideas for a different ending to the book. Idea: Find a
  "reader's guide" to the book in the library or online—the questions can be a good place for starting
  your conversations.


