## PHYSICAL EDUCATION

#### STUDENTS JUMP FOR THEIR HEARTS AND HELP SAVE LIVES


Students at Simonton are jumping at the chance to fight heart disease and stroke, our nation's No. 1 and No. 5 killers. February 6<sup>th</sup> through the 17<sup>th</sup> Simonton will host its annual Jump Rope For Heart event to raise money for the American Heart Association, which funds lifesaving heart and stroke research and community and educational programs for our youth.

Jump Rope For Heart teaches students how physical fitness benefits the heart and shows them that volunteering can be a fun and positive experience for the whole community. The need to educate children about the importance of physical activity couldn't be timelier. According to recent studies, about one-third of children ages 2 to 19 are overweight and obese.

"By including physical activity into their daily routines, kids can significantly reduce the onset and burden of heart disease," said Molly Pearce of American Heart Association. "By raising money through Jump Rope For Heart, we are preventing heart disease and obesity for the next generation of Americans. Kids are literally jumping into a heart healthier life while becoming passionate about raising money for other kids with sick hearts."

#### Families!

February is here and with it some great fun and learning! We will have some fun with Phil the groundhog, study community helpers, learn about friendship, and then wrap the month up with Dr. Seuss! We are working hard on sounding out three letter words and our sight words to help us read. You can help your child by practicing chopping words into sounds and working on rhyming words. Students are also working hard on the addition and subtraction fluency. This is a great activity you can do at home to using snacks, sticks and rocks, beans, or stuffed animals. These students are growing so much more each day! Keep up the amazing work!

## 1st Grade News

For the month of February, the First Grade students will learn about Presidents and American Symbols. They will learn to organize, represent, and interpret data in Math. Students will also use addition and subtraction within 20 to solve Compare problems. In Reading, they will be identifying story elements and retelling stories. In Fundations, the students will be learning vowel team sounds, suffixes, segmenting and blending up to 5 sounds. They will also continue to use thinking maps to organize their writing assignments. Please read with your child every night for 20 minutes and record on reading log. We look forward to meeting with all of you at Parent Teacher Conferences to discuss your child's progress.

2nd Grade News

February is a fun month for 2nd graders! We start off the month with our trip to the Orpheum Theater in Phoenix to see the Slim Goodbody Bodyology Show. In this show, we will be reminded of all the different body systems we learned about earlier in the year, and maybe even meet Slim himself.

In reading, we will begin a fun folktale and fairytale unit, where we compare and contrast different versions of the same story. Later we will write our own version of one of our favorites and share it with the class.

In math, we will continue our work with subtraction using ungrouping (borrowing). This is an important skill for 2nd graders to master. We will learn many different methods to complete the equations, your child is welcome to choose the one that fits them best for homework and testing.

In writing, we have finished our penguin research and will be using it to write reports and comparing papers about penguins. Later, we will practice our letter writing. In December, we touched on it while writing letters to Santa, and this month we will dive in a little bit deeper.

In social studies, we will learn about the westward expansion of the United States. We will have stories, and interactive activities. It should be fun.

Be looking for information from Mrs. Burkhead or Mrs. Schimel regarding procedures for class Valentine's Day celebrations. Also, be on the lookout for a SignUp Genius for conference timeslots. We will see you all there!

# 3rd Grade News

This month in reading, we will finish our unit on folktales and fables. Your child should be able to identify the lesson or moral of a story. In mid-February we will begin our unit about biographies. Students will be reading biographies and completing an assortment of projects as they learn about people who have made a difference in the world. In math we will finish our place value unit and begin our geometry unit. We will study triangles and quadrilaterals and identify their characteristics. We will learn to categorize various shapes according to their characteristics. We will also review area and perimeter. In Science we will be studying plants. We will learn the functions of different parts of a plant. Near the end of February, we will begin our Social Studies unit about the Civil War. We will be celebrating Valentine's Day on Tuesday, February 14<sup>th</sup> with a valentine exchange. Watch for more details as the time gets closer. We appreciate everything that you do to support your child in 3<sup>rd</sup> grade! Thank you!

# 4TH GRADE NEWS

This month fourth grade will continue to focus fractions in math. In reading, we will be looking into the genre of non fiction with a focus on comparing and contrasting. In science, the students will finish up with electricity and move on to magnets. This month students will be starting to track their daily behavior colors. The purpose of tracking the daily colors is in regards to the field trip to the Grand Canyon. Students will need to earn their seat on the bus by reaching their set behavior goal. # READING WITH MS. BONADIO FEBRUARY 2017

#### Parents and Guardians,

Children learn to read by reading! Just as you would take your child to sports practice or dance lessons, reading is a skill that needs to be practiced daily. I will provide you with tips to make reading fun and practical at home each month. Try them out and watch your child soar as a reader.

### Story time: 20 minuter of magic

Experts recommend that parents read to their children for at least 20 minutes a day. It's cozy, it's fun—and it teaches your child skills he can use when he reads on his own. Consider these suggestions for fitting a memorable learning experience into just 20 minutes.

**Pick the time and place**. Try to find times when you can slow down, snuggle up, and read. Choose a place that's free of distractions, especially electronics. You'll show your youngster that reading takes priority over the TV and the phone. **Read to everyone.** Have more than one child? Read to them all at once! It's a nice way for siblings to bond. Plus, when a little one stops you to ask what a word means, an older sibling can take pride in explaining it. Tip: When you have time, try to give each youngster his own read-aloud slot.

**Introduce new books.** Start a new tradition in just 20 minutes. Favorite books are often passed down through generations use story time to share books you loved as a child. Your enjoyment will shine through as you read, which can inspire your youngster to love reading, too.♥

## Be a Spelling Family

Learning to spell doesn't end when you finish school. Show your youngster that spelling is a lifelong endeavor with these ideas that will help her study for spelling tests and learn new words:

• Hold a family spelling bee. Give your child words from her school spelling list. On your turn to spell, she gets to pick a word from the dictionary to try to stump you. Play double or triple elimination to make your spelling bee last longer.

• Have each person learn to spell at least one new word per week and add it to a list on the refrigerator. Your youngster might add words she likes from books, such as neon or velvet. Adults can choose long words like onomatopoeia or lackadaisical—seeing these on your list will introduce your child to big words that are fun to say.

## **FUN WITH WORDS**

#### **Bluff-ulary**

Is a carnivore an animal who loves carnivals or one who eats meat? This bluffing game is a fun way for your child to use his imagination while learning new vocabulary. Use a vocabulary list from school (or a list of fun words that you brainstorm), and write each word on an index card. The leader turns one word, face-up and on a separate index card, secretly writes its definition. Next, each player (including the leader) writes a made-up definition on a separate index card. The trick is to write a definition that other players will think is real! The leader shuffles the cards, including the one with the correct definition, and reads them aloud. Vote for the one you think is real—and score a point if you're correct. You also score a point if someone chooses your fake definition. Continue playing, word by word.

#### ■ Kitten's First Full Moon (Kevin Henkes)

Is that a bowl of milk in the sky? An adorable kitten sees the full moon for the first time and tries her hardest to drink from the "bowl." But no matter what, it never seems to get closer. After a night of mishaps, she returns home to a surprise on her porch. (Also available in Spanish.)

#### ■ Mama Panya's Pancakes: A Village Tale from Kenya (Mary and Rich Chamberlin)

In this story about sharing, Adika and his mother go to the market where Mama Panya makes pancakes. Even though she doesn't have much money, she cooks enough to feed everyone in the village. Includes facts about Kenya, greetings in Kiswahili, and, of course, a pancake recipe!

#### Her Idea (Rilla Alexander)

A little girl named Sozi has a big imagination and is always dreaming up ideas. Like many kids, she figures she'll do something with them later. Then an unlikely helper gives Sozi the perfect place to save her ideas— and the motivation to follow through.

#### ■ I See a Pattern Here (Bruce Goldstone)

Patterns are everywhere—in nature, on buildings, and on your youngster's clothing. This nonfiction book will encourage your child to look for patterns, and figure out what comes next in the patterns pictured.

#### Intermediate Books (4th-6th Grade)

#### A Dragon's Guide to the Care and Feeding of Humans (Laurence Yep and Joanne Ryder)

Miss Drake the dragon tells the story of her new pet human, a 10-year-old named Winnie who refuses to behave like a pet. But watch what happens when Winnie's drawings of magical creatures come to life and terrorize the town!

#### • Mesmerized: How Ben Franklin Solved a Mystery that Baffled All of France (Mara Rockliff)

Bright illustrations, historical details, and a healthy dose of fun are packed into this nonfiction book. After Dr. Franz Mesmer claimed that waving an iron wand over sick people cured them, Benjamin Franklin used the scientific method to prove Mesmer a fraud.

#### Zack Delacruz: Me and My Big Mouth (Jeff Anderson)

Being a "nobody" keeps sixth-grader Zack Delacruz out of trouble. Then, he defends a classmate from a bully's attack and gets more attention than he can handle. Suddenly he's responsible for the school dance fund-raiser—can he pull it off?

#### • One Plastic Bag: Isatou Ceesay and the Recycling Women of the Gambia (Miranda Paul)

When plastic bags piled up along roadsides in Gambia, Isatou knew something needed to be done. This book tells how her campaign to recycle the bags by crocheting them into purses benefited both the environment and the community.


