Eagle Scout Project at Combs Middle School



Combs Middle School community service projects are an important aspect of middle school life. Whether this occurs through all-school activities or on an individual basis, CMS regularly welcomes the opportunity to serve others. One aspect of community service that happens often at the middle school is that of an Eagle Scout project.

To earn the Eagle Scout rank, the highest advancement rank in Scouting, a Boy Scout must fulfill requirements in the areas of leadership, service, and outdoor skills. The significance of a young man becoming an Eagle Scout has always carried a special honor not only in Scouting but also as he enters higher education, business, and industry. The award is a performance-based achievement

whose standards have been well-maintained over the years. Not every young man who joins a Boy Scout troop earns the Eagle Scout rank; approximately 5% of all Boy Scouts do. This represents more than 2 million Boy Scouts who have earned this special rank since 1912.

Central Arizona College (CAC) - Promise for the Future



CMS 8th grade students will attend a presentation on Promise for the Future on April 25th. Promise for the Future is a program designed to encourage students who reside in Pinal County to stay in high school, graduate with a 2.75 grade point average, and participate in 20 hours of community service. Students along

with their parent/guardian complete a contract of commitment during the students' eighth grade year. Contracts must be completed by May 23rd. Students graduating from a Pinal County high school who have fulfilled the requirements of the Promise for the Future contract will be eligible for the Promise for the Future Scholarship. This scholarship entitles them to free tuition to any Central Arizona College campus for up to four consecutive semesters.

To <u>receive</u> the Promise for the Future Scholarship, the student must:

- Complete the FASFA financial aid form and Promise for the Future Scholarship Acceptance Form
- Enroll in a minimum of 12 credit hours per semester
- Enroll in and complete CPD 101 (Orientation to Student Development)
- Declare an eligible degree or certificate program
- Begin by the fall semester after high school graduation

To renew the Promise for the Future Scholarship each semester the student must:

- Maintain a minimum 2.5 cumulative GPA. (This includes ANY courses taken at CAC or through high school for college credit.)
- Complete a minimum of 9 credits each semester
- Maintain continuous enrollment each semester excluding summer term
- Allow the Financial Aid office to verify and ensure student meets eligibility requirements

The Promise for the Future Scholarship is limited to four (4) consecutive semesters of In-State tuition. If the student is unable to meet the scholarship requirements due to any circumstance, they will permanently lose this scholarship. Food Service Reminder

Students will not be allowed to make a purchase using their district food service account that would result in the student carrying a negative balance on their account after August 28th. In the near future, Food Service will be communicating with families that are carrying a negative balance to assist them with addressing this.



Preschool Head Start and Early Head Start

The San Tan Valley Preschool Head Start and Early Head Start programs are now accepting applications. Preschool Head Start is a center based program for three and four year olds. Priority is given to low income families, homeless families, foster children, and families with children that have a disability. This program is a kindergarten readiness program and provides health/family services. This center based program offers morning/afternoon classes. Each class runs Monday-Thursday and is four hours in length.

Early Head Start is a home based program for families up to age three. Weekly home visits and educational plans are provided for children with health, nutrition, and family services. This is a quality program for teen parents. This is a year round program, and applications are continuously being taken.

San Tan Valley Preschool Head Start and Early Head Start programs are operated by Pinal Gila Community Child Services. Services are provided at no charge to families.

Programs offer a developmentally appropriate approach to encourage exploration and learning. Activities are geared toward Kindergarten readiness. Child progress reports are reviewed with parents/caregivers quarterly. Developmental assessments and health screenings are conducted. Parent involvement activities are offered such as goal setting, referrals, parent training, and volunteering in the classroom. Nutritious meals/snacks are served. Transportation is not provided.

Applications are being taken at San Tan Valley Head Start (301 E. Combs Road, San Tan Valley, AZ 85140). You will need to bring proof of guardianship and a current immunization record for the child. You will also need to provide proof of all household income for the past 12 months. For questions or to schedule an appointment, call 480-987-1845.
