Happenings in the classroom....





April is a very exciting month in Kindergarten. We will be starting our unit on Farms and how food gets from the farm to our table. We will then be taking our field trip to the Farm! We will also be discussing animal life cycles and get to watch a caterpillar grow into a butterfly! We will celebrate Earth Day by learning about all the ways we can help take care of the Earth. In FUNdations we are still practicing our digraphs and beginning to use them in our writing. We are also reading paragraphs and practicing answering questions about them. In math , we are learning all about 3D or solid shapes and beginning to solve more difficult addition and subtraction problems. Looking forward to a month full of fun and learning!

FIRST GRADE

Wow! Can you believe it's April already? This year has seemed to fly by! We are very excited about our upcoming field trip to the Phoenix Zoo on April 11th! The cost is 6.00 and please have your child's permission slip signed by Friday, April 7th. We have one day off this month for the Spring Holiday! Please check the master schedule for this date.

- In Fundations we will be working with vowel consonant-e syllable words.
- Students will read non-fiction stories about insects and animals.
- Students will be learning time and shapes in this math unit.
- Our writing focus will be writing to report information.
- Fundations and math homework will be a similar format. Be sure to practice timed reading for 1 minute each night!

SECOND GRADE



This month in Fundations we will begin working on Vowel Teams and the "D" syllable. In reading we are working on comparing, contrasting, and biographies. We are continuing our paragraph writing with personal narratives. In math, we will begin working more in depth with word problems. We will be working with compare word problems, finding unknown addends in word problems, and mixed word problems.

Please continue to have your child read 25 minutes each night, along with the fluency passages that are sent home. Thank you for all you do! Please feel free to contact us with any questions or concerns.





- We are coming down the home stretch for the AZ Merit testing. Thank you for your continually support. We appreciate you getting the kids to bed on time, feeding them nutritious breakfast, and being a positive support.
- It's been a fun time reviewing all of our concepts and standards by playing review games and completing center activities.
- Math: Fun times with geometry exploration!!! So many names for a square. The kids had a great learning experience while sorting and classifying shapes.
- ELA: Read, read, read!!!! The best way to become a better reader and writer is to spend time reading. The kids have been reading all about life science through many types of texts. It has helped them review for the big assessment.
- Science: The fourth quarter will be full of learning through reading and exploration. In April, the kids have had the opportunity to go on many "Virtual Field Trips" to explore different ecosystems and habitats. Be prepared for our big trip to Australia!!!!

Young Coyotes

Young Coyotes daycare services children ages 3-5 years old and combines play and learning in a child centered environment where exploration is encouraged. Children are provided opportunities to grow socially, emotionally, and academically through hands on activities involving music, art, and dramatic play. Young Coyotes is taught by a veteran preschool teacher with 20 years experience in early childhood. We now have 2 schools that will have our Young Coyotes program, Ranch Elementary and Ellsworth Elementary. Young Coyotes is licensed by Department of Health Services and approved by the Department of Economic Security. Children must be potty trained and current on shots. Parents must provide a sack breakfast and/or lunch.

Hours of Operation: Monday- Friday from 6:30 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. not including school holidays.

Pricing: Parents have a choice of either full or part day options.

Half day \$20 per day or \$75 per week

Full day \$40 per day of \$150 per week

Take Flight Fridays




We had such an amazing year with our Take Flight Friday Program.

Resource

Learning the multiplication facts can be a daunting task for a lot of students. A different way to support your child in math is to help them learn to skip count. If they are able to skip count their numbers from 1-12, they can use this to help them solve a problem that requires multiplication. Skip counting only takes a minute or two to practice and is a great benefit.

Examples:

3,6,9,12,15,18,21,24,27,30,33,36

6,12,18,24,30,36,42,48,54,60,66,72

Count while your in the car, setting the dinner table, taking showers, etc.

ELL

ELL students are learning English at the same time they are learning rigorous academic content, all while trying to remain balanced between their primary culture and the new one that they are now learning in. Parents can help their students make the transition into an English speaking school environment by helping students develop English and academic literacy at home. Try using the strategies below to help your ELL child become academically successful in not one language, but multiple.

- **Don't be afraid to use your native tongue.** This tip may be the most important since it is the bridge between your child's learning situations that is, the connection between his or her primary language and culture and new language and culture. You can explain unfamiliar words and concepts in the language familiar to your child and continue to build his or her literacy skills in the primary language, while practicing and developing English and academic literacies.
- When it comes to homework, have a routine. Establishing a good study routine at home can make a significant difference in your child's learning. Provide a quiet environment by removing or minimizing any potential distractions and make sure that your child has all the supplies he or she needs including pencils, books, paper, etc. Take the time to answer any questions your child may have. If you don't know the answers, you can help your child find resources to help answer the questions he or she has, or you can help your child write down the question to ask his or her teacher. Even if you cannot yet speak English yourself, you can still check on your child to see if homework assignments are finished.

Title 1 Reading

No matter how old your children are they will benefit from listening to you read aloud to them. Sharing a story can be an enjoyable time for both you and your children while helping them grow as readers. The books you choose can be a little above their reading ability. By discussing the plot and unknown words you will be helping their comprehension and vocabulary grow. Once you have finished the book, have fun discussing it. You might ask them who their favorite character was and if they would like to trade places with them. How would they change the ending? Be creative with your discussions. Your children will begin to think more deeply about the plot. This will carry over to stories they read on their own. Happy Reading!

J.O. Combs is excited to begin its 3rd season for Unified Basketball. Unified Sports are sponsored by Special Olympics and are AIA supported.

Unified basketball games are conducted in 8 minute quarters with a running clock. The team consists of "Athletes" and "Partners." Athletes are students with special needs specifically with intellectual delays. Partners are typically developing peers and can be students with IEPs without intellectual delays. The team practices at Combs High on Mondays and Thursday. The athletes are from both our middle and high school.

For 3 years consecutively our Co-Coaches have been Varsity Basketball Coach, Mr. Kirk Fauske, and Previous Varsity Girl's basketball co-coach, Ms. Jette Thompson. Mr. Fauske has been teacher special education at Combs since the fall of 2009 and Ms. Thompson is a Counselor at both the high school and Combs Traditional Academy and is in her 4th year at Combs.

The Unified Teams play 5 games and then have the opportunity to participate in a Saturday tournament held at Perry High School in Chandler. This season we play against Higley, Chandler, Queen Creek.
