

Your State Tax dollars go to the Arizona Department of Revenue



You can direct the State to send your tax dollars to Page Schools—up to \$400 (married filing jointly) or \$200 (single filers) of the taxes you are ALREADY paying!

As Tax Day approaches this month, please keep our students in mind and use the Arizona State Tax Credit Donation to support our local schools. You simply fill out a half-page form ar

Already did your 2015 taxes? You can donate any time and use that tax credit on your 2016 tax return. Simply write on the memo line of your check whether the donation is for 2015 or 2016.

The Impact of Impact Aid

With the mission set to Provide Arizona's Greatest Education (PAGE), Page Unified School district utilizes over 70 income sources to meet the needs of students, build and maintain capital improvements, and cover operating expenses. Of these sources, you will often hear about Impact Aid. What is Impact Aid and how does it affect PUSD?



Impact Aid is a federal program designed to reimburse local school districts for federal activity that impacts property taxes (such as removing land from local tax rolls) and for educating students living on federal or Native American land. The idea is that because of a federal government presence in the local area, school districts are asked to do more with less. The need to assist local school districts was identified in the 1800's with

regard to educating military dependent children and rules and regulations were added over the next 200 years to define and expand assistance, including the Johnson O'Malley Act of 1934 which specifically addressed the needs of Native American students.

Impact Aid makes up a large portion of PUSD's funding sources, accounting for almost 20% of the overall budget. Unfortunately, the program is not forward funded, fully funded or permanent and is often part of a political bargaining chip in federal political circles. Because of this uncertainty, our PUSD Business Office closely monitors any announced changes to the program and tries to anticipate any increases or decreases in annual payments. Changes are calculated based on need as defined by the number of federally connected students and the percentage of the school district budget that is made up of Impact Aid revenue.

The benefits of Impact Aid are significant in Page because the funds are paid directly to PUSD, can be used for any lawful purpose and can be used to benefit all students, not just those federally connected students. Additional Impact Aid funds may be available to assist with the education of children with disabilities as long as those funds are use only for those students.

Our Indian Education Office and Indian Education Council are an integral part of the Impact Aid program as they make sure that Indian Policies and Procedures (IPP) are in place. When in place, the IPP see to it that Native American students are allowed to participate in all programs on an equal basis; parents are allowed to present views and provide comment on school programs; parents are consulted and involved in planning the school programs, plans, applications, and evaluation of school programs are disseminated to parents and tribes; and parents have an opportunity to present their views on how the school is doing.

We need to fight for and strengthen the Impact Aid program. It is a great benefit to our students and we need to educate our Senators and Representatives about the merits and need for the program. There is an Impact Aid Coalition for the both the Senate and the House that you can ask your representatives to join as these coalitions are the "voice" of Impact Aid on Capital Hill. The House Impact Aid Coalition and the Senate Impact Aid Coalition fight for reauthorization each budget cycle and present our local stories to the powers that be. Impact Aid greatly impacts Page schools in a significant and beneficial manner. We are thankful for the opportunities afforded our students through its implementation.
