Overview of the NCAA Initial Eligibility Process

What is the NCAA Initial-Eligibility Clearinghouse?

The NCAA Initial-Eligibility Clearinghouse (the Clearinghouse) is an organization that works with the NCAA to determine a student's eligibility for athletics participation in his or her first year of college



enrollment. Students who want to participate in college sports during their first year of enrollment in college must register with the Clearinghouse.

Located in Iowa City, Iowa, the Clearinghouse staff follows NCAA bylaws and regulations

in analyzing and processing a student's high school academic records, ACT or SAT scores, and key information about amateurism participation, to determine the student's initial elibility.

After November 1, 2007 the NCAA Initial Eligibility Center will be relocated to Indianapolis, IN and will be renamed the NCAA Eligibility Center.

What do I need to do before I can make an official visit?

- 1. Register for the NCAA Clearinghouse
- 2. Complete the Student Release Form
- 3. Pay the \$50 Registration Fee
- 4. Make sure you have taken the ACT/SAT

What is the cost?

There is only one fee to register for the clearinghouse, which covers both the academic and amateurism certification: \$50 for domestic prospects and \$75 for international students.

When should I register?

Register for the Clearinghouse at the beginning of your junior year in high school and be sure to update the athletics participation section regularly. There is no deadline; however, prospective student-athletes must be certified as an amateur before they may receive an athletics scholarship or practice or compete at a Division I or II institution.

How do I register?

To register for the Clearinghouse, simply go to www.ncaaclearinghouse.net. Click on prospective student-athlete, then click on either the Domestic or International Student Release Form. Complete <u>ALL</u> of the questions and submit your answers.

What do I need to do before I can be eligible to play Division I sports?

- 1. Register for the NCAA Clearinghouse
- 2. Complete the Student Release Form
- 3. Complete the Amateurism Questionnaire
- 4. Pay the \$50 Registration Fee
- 5. Have your standardized test score (SAT and/or ACT) sent to the Clearinghouse directly from the testing agency
- 6. Have your high school send your official transcripts directly to the Clearinghouse and the institution you are applying for
- 7. Officially apply for admissions at your selected institution

Academic-Eligibility Requirements Division I

2008-2009

If you enroll in a Division I college in 2008 or after, and want to participate in athletics or receive an athletics scholarship during your first year, you must:

- Graduate from high school;
- · Complete these 16 core courses:
 - o 4 years of English
 - o 3 years of mathematics (Algebra I or higher)
 - o 2 years of natural/physical science (one must be a lab science)
 - o 1 year of additional English, math or science
 - o 2 years of social studies
 - 4 years of additional core courses (from any area listed above, or from foreign language, nondoctrinal religion or philosophy)
- Earn a minimum required grade-point average in your core courses; and
- Earn a combined SAT or ACT sum score that matches your core-course grade-point average on the test score sliding scale on this page (for example, a 2.400 core-course gradepoint average needs an 860 SAT).

Note: Computer science courses can be used as core courses only if your high school grants graduation credit in math or natural or physical science for them, and if the courses appear on your high school's core-course list as math or science courses.

You will be a qualifier if you meet the academic requirements listed above. As qualifier, you:

- Can practice or compete for your college or university during your first year of college;
- Can receive an athletics scholarship during your first year of college; and
- Can play four seasons in your sport if you maintain your eligibility from year to year.

You will be a nonqualifier if you do not meet the academic requirements listed above. As a nonqualifier, you:

- Cannot practice or compete for your college or university during your first year of college;
- Cannot receive an athletics scholarship during your first year of college, although you may receive need-based financial aid; and
- Can play only three seasons in your sport if you maintain your eligibility from year to year (to earn a fourth season you must complete at least 80 percent of your degree requirements before beginning your fifth year of college).
