

Free Breakfast & Lunch Program

Baboquivari USD and Sodexo have secured an Equipment Grant that was awarded to eligible school food authorities (SFAs) participating in the National School Lunch Program (NSLP). These funds will allow SFAs to purchase equipment to serve healthier meals that meet the updated meal patterns, with emphasis on more fruits and vegetables in school meals, improve food safety, and expand access.

It has been with a heart for student well being that we have applied and been approved for the Community Eligibility Provision.

The intent of the Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) is to improve access to FREE school meals in eligible high poverty Local Educational Agencies (LEAs) and schools to eliminate administrative burden of collecting household applications.

With this program in place all students at Baboquivari USD will eat for FREE both breakfast and lunch. We encourage parents to send their child(ren) to school each morning where we will provide a nutritious breakfast and lunch.



As a school district, our purpose is to create a positive academic impact on every child's life, everyday! We aim to do this through thoughtful engagement with our community, district staff, parents and students to ensure that we are working together to support and inspire our students to meet their full potential.

Our external partners help us to leverage talent and resources so that as a district we strengthen our systems for teaching and learning thereby achieving sustainable improvement and student success. Our goal is to empower the system- our educators- and our students so that teaching and learning have a positive and real impact on the lives on our students.



Baboquivari Unified School District implements rigorous programs that advance our vision to ensure our students are academically prepared, know their Himdag, and have life skills to exceed. Each program enhances the work we do and strengthens our systems overall in unique but complimentary ways:

AVID - Advancement Via Individual Determination, is a program dedicated to closing the achievement gap by preparing all students for college and other postsecondary opportunities. The AVID programs at our elementary, middle and high school utilize research-based strategies and curriculum to develop students' critical thinking, literacy, and math skills across all content areas throughout each campus:

- AVID teaches skills and behaviors for academic success
- AVID provides intensive support with tutorials and fosters strong student and teacher relationships
- AVID creates a positive peer group for students

He shared his story of determination and perseverance with thousands of students, educators, and educational leaders from across the country.

UVA – The University of Virginia Turnaround Program is the only program in the country dedicated to establishing district and school system conditions needed to set the stage for change and to build transformative leadership capacity to achieve that change. This is a district and school leadership development program that emphasizes improving the school system's conditions through four main levers of change: Leadership, Differentiated Support and Accountability, Talent Management, Instructional Infrastructure. Focusing on these levers, the UVA Turnaround Program aims to create the system-wide infrastructure necessary to quickly, dramatically and sustainably improve student performance: Leadership: Systems require the will and capacity to prioritize what is necessary to improve the lives of the children they serve and present a clear vision for the path ahead. Differentiated Support and Accountability: System leaders must provide schools with the capacity-building, support, accountability and flexibility needed to achieve urgent change. This support is tailored to each individual

system and school.

Talent Management: Creating the environment for success requires having the right people in place to carry out the work. BUSD collaborates with UVA to enhance the selection and retention of highly effective staff and the development of existing staff.

Instructional Infrastructure: A core component of our work involves data-driven instruction to create an evidence-based approach to better serve students. Our Superintendent and our District Shepherd work closely with school administrators and teachers to implement a cohesive assessment strategy, responsive data systems and to develop a high-quality curriculum.

As the District Shepherd, Lisa Cogan is responsible for leading implementation of Baboquivari Unified School District's UVA turnaround initiative,

including providing targeted support to each school and its principals to ensure effective implementation of comprehensive systems associated with the initiative.

AdvancED - is the largest community of education professionals in the world. AdvancED is committed to helping districts and schools continuously improve their systems so that teaching and learning are highly effective. They are a non-profit, non-partisan organization that conducts rigorous, on-site external reviews of school districts and school systems to ensure that all learners realize their full potential. This academic year, AdvancED will conduct their onsite review of Baboquivari Unified School District and help us identify areas in need of further support and refinement as well as to highlight areas of strength

that are having a direct and positive impact on our students.

Engagement in each of these programs increases our ability to continuously improve our systems for teaching and learning so that all our students will be academically prepared, know their Himdag, and have life skills to excel.

District-Wide Weekly Collaboration and Professional Learning

We believe that we learn with and through collaboration with one another. As our schools work to improve the overall quality of teaching and learning across our school district a key principle impacting our students' success is the engagement of each educator and their collaboration and support of one another.

Every Thursday, teachers and administrators at every school site conduct thoughtful data analysis and planning or engage in new learning and sharing of promising instructional practices.

As a district we are committed to increasing the instructional capacity of all our educators so that they are empowered and able to provide our students with quality and meaningful learning experiences that support every student in being a successful learner. Everyone in our school district benefits from collective problem solving, planning and continued support of one another.

Thursdays' collaboration and professional learning time is sacred and it is the driving force of our school district's purpose to create a positive academic impact on every child's life, everyday!

Data Driven Instruction (DDI)

Data Driven Instruction (DDI) is a precise and systematic approach to improving student learning throughout the year. The inquiry cycle of data-driven instruction includes assessment, analysis, and action and is a key framework for school-wide support to improve student success.

"Data-driven instruction is the philosophy that schools should constantly focus on one simple question: are our students learning?" (Bambrick, 2012).

This academic year, Baboquivari Unified School District is working to implement DDI and to shift our thinking from "what was taught" to "what was learned". As part of our initiative, BUSD implemented a new assessment system SchoolCity which provides assessments and performance tasks aligned to college readiness and Arizona's newly adopted state assessment AzMERIT.

Working with the end in mind, teachers and administrators engage in regular cycles of data analysis and identify what our students know and are able to do, as well as pinpoint specific gaps in student learning.



Information on student learning is only powerful when teachers work together and collaboratively develop plans of action at the grade level, class level and individual student level targeted at closing these identified achievement gaps.

Each school is comprised of school-based inquiry teams that analyze data for target groups of students that share common learning challenges, investigate the root causes and skill gaps, use research-based instructional strategies to address the weaknesses at the skill level, and continually evaluate the strategies being used.

We believe that in order for our Data Driven Instruction Model to be successful our teacher teams need ongoing training and support from their highly active school and district leadership team so that teacher teams effectively engage in the Data Driven Instructional Process.

Our Commitment and Plan

The Primary staff has made the commitment to collaborate in order to effectively plan lessons that will encourage deep thinking and mastery of content, as well as application of student learning. Our assessments will help us to determine what types of lessons and enrichment will assist our students in achieving at their highest level of understanding. McKinney-Vento Act



If your family lives in any of the following situations:

- In a shelter, motel, vehicle, or campground
- On the street
- In an abandoned building, trailer, or other inadequate accommodations, or
- Doubled up with friends or relatives because you cannot find or afford housing

Then, your preschool-aged and school-aged children have certain rights or protections under the McKinney-Vento Homeless Education Assistance Act.

Your children have the right to:

- Go to school, no matter where you live or how long you have lived there. They must be given access to the same public education, including preschool education, provided to other children.
- Continue in the school they attended before you became homeless or the school they last attended, if that is your choice and is feasible. If a school sends your child to a school other than the one you request, the school must provide you with a written explanation and offer you the right to appeal
- Receive transportation to the school they attended before your family became homeless or the school they last attended, if you or a guardian request such transportation.
- Attend a school and participate in school programs with children who are not homeless. Children cannot be separated from the regular school program because they are homeless.
- Enroll in school without giving a permanent address. Schools cannot require proof of residency that might prevent or delay school enrollment.
- Enroll and attend classes while the school arranges for the transfer of school and immunization records or any other documents required for enrollment.
- Enroll and attend classes in the school of your choice even while the school and you seek to resolve a dispute over enrolling your children.
- Receive the same special programs and services, if needed, as provided to all other children served in these programs.
- Receive transportation to school and to school programs.

When you move, you should do the following:

- Contact the school district's local liaison for homeless education (see phone number below) for help in enrolling your child in a new school or arranging for your child to continue in his or her former school. (Or, someone at a shelter, social services office, or the school can direct you to the person you need to contact.)
- Contact the school and provide any information you think will assist the teachers in helping your child adjust to new circumstances.
- Ask the local liaison for homeless education, the shelter provider, or a social worker for assistance with clothing and supplies, if needed.



BMS Football Field Gets A New Name

The BUSD Governing Board unanimously ▲ approved the naming of the BMS Football Field to the Dane Manuel Field at their regular board meeting on Tuesday, September 8, 2015. The BUSD Policy states that in naming a facility (building, field, gym, etc.), a committee must be created with members of the site where a facility is to be named to include a student and administration. The proposal to name the facility came from Tanya Suydam, mother of the late, Dane Manuel' sons. As many of you know, Dane was a groundsman for Baboquivari Unified SD as well as coach for Football. He inspired and motivated his players and taught them to be better young men. He lost his life to natural causes (lightning) while working on his field in August 2014. The committee reviewed the proposal and made a recommendation to the BUSD Governing Board to approve.

The plan will be for Facilities to create a common plaque that will withstand the weather for any other future naming of facilities.

The desire is to have the Dane Manuel Field blessed and formerly named sometime in late October. Details will be on our district homepage at www.busd40.org.



What Is The Law In Paying For Athlete's Meals?

Public schools receive money in the form of state allocation based on number of students enrolled in a given school district. It does not set aside funds for athletics, thus the reason you might have heard a big push to charge fees for athletes.

These fees go towards paying the Arizona Interscholastic Association for allowing our students to play in AIA sanctioned sports against other AIA sanctioned sports and schools. Other fees go towards paying for qualified AIA referees that also include a driving and mileage fee to come out to Baboquivari Unified. Baboquivari currently relies on gifts and/or donations to help support our athletes with supplies, new equipment, uniforms, and meals.

Unfortunately, the donations have been depleted and we do not have the funding to pay for away game meals. We do, however pay in excess of \$250,000.00 each year to support our athletic programs by paying coach stipends, qualifying and certifying equipment for safety, purchasing uniforms and equipment, and providing transportation to and from practice as well as to the games and back to Sells.


Mr. Sixkiller joins governing board president, Ms. Sara Mae Williams, and governing

Pedestrian Hybrid Beacon

The Tohono O'odham community will have a new addition on Hwy. 86 to help ensure pedestrian safety. ADOT has a project to put in a Pedestrian Hybrid Beacon (PHB), which has been awarded to contractor, CS Construction out of Phoenix and have set a start date of Nov.12 with construction ending Jan. 30, 2016 IOES Intermediate Campus and IOHS/MS Alternative students and their families will be some of the beneficiaries.

Rod Lane, ADOT Tucson District Engineer said, "State Route 86 is the major artery for residents of the Tohono O'odham Nation and for regional travelers in southern Arizona. The addition of this Pedestrian Hybrid Beacon will help provide residents – including students at Baboquivari Unified School District – a safer way to cross the highway. And, for all of us, safety is the primary concern."



Laptop Deployment

Students in grades 3-12 will now have the option to take home district issued laptops. Students will begin taking laptops home the last week of November.

Some requirements must be met for a student to take home a laptop. Parents must attend a 30 minute introduction to student laptops and internet safety. All students must complete internet safety courses. All students must study the laptop handbook.

Additional requirements will be aligned to the students general academic responsibility; including, but not limited to, behavior, responsibility with AVID skills, and their taking home and returning of homework.
