

Need-Based Scholarship Grant Procedure for the International School of Ulm/Neu-Ulm gGmbH

The International School of Ulm/Neu-Ulm offers a needs-based scholarship, which is granted by the Scholarship Committee of the ISU gGmbH.

The scholarship is granted for only one school year and must be applied for each year thereafter.

Basic requirements for a scholarship are:

- a. There is a particular necessity for the student to attend the International School of Ulm/Neu-Ulm and not a German school. Necessary reasons could include a previous international background, insufficient knowledge of German, or the intention to move work related to another country, where the student can continue his/her career at another international school.
- b. ISU determines that student shows strong academic progress and potential.
- c. A statement by the applicant's employer that the school fees of ISU will not be covered either in its entirety or in part.
- d. There is room available at the school for the applicant.
- e. A written statement from the student outlining his/her motivation for attending ISU as well as his/her personal interests and goals (should be in writing for students in Grade 3 and older).
- f. Progress reports from current or previous schools for the preceding two years.
- g. Parent income tax statements for the preceding three years. If parents are taxed separately, both statements are required.

Need-Based Scholarship Criteria

The combined income of the parents who are applying for one child, cannot exceed 60.000 Euro gross per year. For every additional child not attending ISU, 6.000 Euro are added to the income sum. For every additional child who is either attending or planning to attend ISU, 12.000 Euro are added to the income sum.

The parent's assets are also considered in determining scholarship eligibility.

In some special circumstances, a transitional partial scholarship may be granted even though the criteria are not met. Depending on the circumstances, parents would be expected to pay from 30 to 60 percent of school fees.
