The relationship between Edgewood Campus School and the Sisters of St. Therese of Lisieux of Tanzania Africa began 20 years ago. In 1990, through private funding, Sister Hellen Bandiho arrived in Madison to obtain her undergraduate and graduate degrees in business at Edgewood College. Sr. Margaret O'Brien, OP found room and board for Sister Hellen with the Dominicans who resided at Blessed Sacrament Convent where Sister Kathleen Malone, OP lived at the time. Sr. Hellen was invited to live with the Sisters, and the friendship between the Campus School and the African Sisters began.

Sr. Hellen's goal while here was to further her education and at the same time raise the funds to bring another ten Sisters to study here. She exceeded that goal many times over and today Sisters of St. Therese of Lisieux are being educated in Milwaukee at Alverno College and throughout the United States.

Sister Hellen continued her studies and was awarded her PhD in 1999 from Duquesne University, Pittsburgh, PA. She returned to Tanzania and served on the General Council of the Order. She is now Dean of the School of Business at St. Augustine University of Tanzania.

The special friendship between Sr. Kathleen and Sr. Hellen has flourished and grown to include the families, students, and faculties at both Edgewood Campus School in Madison and St. Therese School in Dar es Salaam.

The piece of art used on the cover of this Annual Report was a gift to Sister Kathleen. It is made from pressed tree bark and dried palm leaves.

Venerable Father Samuel Mazzuchelli, OP

Founder of the Dominican Sisters of Sinsinawa



Samuel Mazzuchelli, born in Milan, Italy, on November 4, 1806, descended from a wealthy family of merchants and bankers. At age 17, Samuel entered the Dominican Order of Preachers against his father's wishes and at a time when the Order was struggling.

This remarkable Italian-American, at the age of 22, came to the American frontier in 1828. After his priestly ordination, he was assigned by Cincinnati Bishop Edward Fenwick to be missionary priest of the whole Northwest Territory.

Father Mazzuchelli traveled this vast area on horseback, in native canoes, and on foot to serve the people scattered on the vast Northwest frontier, from the Great Lakes to the Mississippi and beyond. His travels took him

into southwestern Wisconsin, northern Illinois and eastern Iowa. Those who called him to ministry were families of native tribes, and new immigrant settlers, miners, and farmers, as well as political leaders, Catholics, and Protestants.

In September 1844, he purchased 800 acres of land in the southwest corner of Wisconsin, which is now the Sinsinawa Mound. That became the motherhouse for the Sinsinawa Dominican Sisters, the order he founded in 1847.

He established many local parish communities that remain to this day. He designed and built more than 24 churches and civic buildings before his death in 1864 at the age of 57. From that time until now, increasing numbers of people have asked his help in prayer.

On July 6, 1993, His Holiness Pope John Paul II declared Father Samuel Mazzuchelli "Venerable." This is the first step to canonization or official Church recognition of his sanctity. Rome formally acknowledged that his virtues were heroic: "Beyond doubt" Father Samuel exemplified the theological virtues of faith, hope, and charity and the cardinal virtues of prudence, justice, fortitude, and temperance. The title "Venerable" was granted in response to a formal request made to Rome 30 years before, in 1964. We are now praying that Rome will name him "Blessed," the second step toward canonization or sainthood.

The Sinsinawa Dominican Sisters continued to thrive and grow. New missions proliferated, a pattern that would continue into the 20th century. Five academies were founded, and parish grade schools were assigned to the Congregation in Chicago, Milwaukee and throughout Illinois, Wisconsin, Iowa, Minnesota, South Dakota, Oklahoma and Nebraska,

Today the Order sponsors seven schools: Dominican University in River Forest, IL, Queen of Peace High School in Burbank, IL, Dominican High School in Whitefish Bay, WI, Bethlehem Academy in Faribault, MN, as well as Edgewood College, Edgewood High School and Edgewood Campus School.

School Profile

OVERVIEW

Edgewood Campus School is a private Catholic school founded in 1881 by the Dominican Sisters of Sinsinawa. The campus is located in Madison, WI on the northern shores of Lake Wingra. Classes are offered from four-year-old kindergarten (4K) through grade 8, and the school hosts an after-school program. Children of all religions, nationalities and cultural traditions are welcome.

Edgewood Campus School, Edgewood High School and Edgewood College share the 55-acre Edgewood campus. Each institution has its own administration and Board of Trustees. The Schools of Edgewood work collaboratively in areas of curriculum planning, facilities, technology, community relations, development, work-study student placement, community service and teacher continuing education.

Campus School students attend classes in the Edgewood Campus School building, the Todd Wehr Edgedome, the Sonderegger Science Center and the Middle School within Edgewood High School. Liturgies are held at St. Joseph Chapel in Regina Hall at Edgewood College.

Athletic Committee

The Edgewood Campus School Athletic Committee is a parent group that aids in the administration and organization of the athletic program. The committee is made up of volunteer parents, the Athletic Director, a faculty representative and an administrator.

The committee is responsible for orienting players and parents at the beginning of each season, explaining rules and regulations of each sport, and sharing the player/parent/coach expectations in regard to conduct, practice, facility use and responsibilities.

The Athletic Committee, which is self-supporting, develops an annual budget based on the participation fees and fund-raisers to cover the cost of the football, volleyball, basketball, track and softball programs for students in grades 5 through 8. Participation fees cover about 90% of the cost of equipment, facilities, officials and uniforms. Fund-raisers are held to meet the final budget. The athletic budget is about \$25,000 per year.

The fund-raiser that supports the Athletic Committee is the sale of spirit wear.

Edgewood Campus School is a member of the Madison Area Independent Sports League (MAISL) competing with other local Catholic and independent schools in touch football, volleyball, basketball, softball and track. Participation in these athletic events is open to all boys and girls in 4th (track only), and 5th through 8th grade.

The goals of the athletic program at Edgewood Campus School include:

- to enrich the students' experiences through pride in representing their school,
- to build teamwork,
- to promote good sportsmanship,
- to promote physical fitness, and
- to develop positive self-esteem.

At least 85% of the students in grades four through eight participate in the athletic program.

New All-Day Kindergarten for 4-Year-Olds




Beginning in the fall of 2009 the Campus School began offering an all-day kindergarten program for four-year-olds.

"We made this decision based on extensive research on the current and future needs of the early learner," stated Kathleen Malone, OP, President/Principal of Edgewood Campus School. "This enhanced program will be beneficial to both the students as well as the parents. We are responding to the needs of our community."

The all-day four-year-old kindergarten program follows the Wisconsin Model of Early Learning Standards prepared by the Department of Public Instruction. It emphasizes spiritual, health and

physical, social and emotional, language and communication development. The approaches to learning include curiosity, engagement and persistence, invention and imagination, and cognitive skills.

The core curriculum includes religion, language arts, mathematics, social studies and science. Special subjects include art, music, physical education, library, and technology. A guidance counselor provides a program that is designed to enrich students with various life skills.



FUNDING

Edgewood Campus School is a private Catholic school (not affiliated with a parish) founded in 1881 by the Sinsinawa Dominican Sisters. With an operating budget of \$2 million, about 85% is funded by tuition. To meet the budget, the remainder is raised through fund development (gifts of cash, stock, real estate, life insurance and bequests) and through various fund-raising campaigns run through the Home and School Organization and the Athletic Committee.

A small amount of financial aid is available at Edgewood Campus School for need-based tuition assistance. Families are eligible to apply for assistance after they have been at Edgewood Campus School for at least one year. Applicants must complete an income disclosure form. Students of these families must be making satisfactory academic progress and have a positive attitude that reflects our values of truth, compassion, justice, community and partnership. Families must re-apply for tuition assistance each year. The amount given will not cover the full cost of tuition.





Project CRYSTAL brings middle-school students to UW-Madison lab

Biochemistry professor Hazel Holden and Edgewood Campus School middle-school science teacher Daniel Toomey met for the first time because Holden's daughter was in Toomey's science class.

Neither anticipated that less than three years after their first encounter at the Madison school, they'd be working closely to bridge the gap between middle-school science and groundbreaking research, and to get young adolescents excited about chemistry before high school.

"We just thought we've got to teach chemistry at an earlier age, and we've got to make it exciting," Holden says, "By the time you get to high school, you've kind of set the path for what you want to do."

Realizing the potential a partnership between a middle-school science teacher and a biochemistry researcher would have for both the teenagers and Holden's lab, the two teamed up to form Project CRYSTAL (Crystallographers Researching with Young Scientists: Teaching And Learning).

The duo was awarded a grant from the National Science Foundation (NSF) last April to bring six students from Edgewood Campus School to research X-ray crystallography alongside graduate students in Holden's lab.

Six students began their research at the

beginning of the 2009-10 school year. They make the trip to the UW-Madison campus once a week to assist Holden and the graduate students in real-world research.

It gives young students an opportunity to learn that the world of science extends far beyond textbook experiments.

"A lot of what we do as science educators in K-12 is pretty much the cookbook labs where you know the results, and that's not science," Toomey says. "What the kids are realizing is you have to observe and you wait for your results, and they're probably not what you expected. I think that's the beauty of this for them, that they get a chance to realize that there's not always a clear-cut answer."

Project CRYSTAL also gives graduate students an unusual teaching opportunity, and the teaching assistants serve as role models for the students, since they are closer in age than most of their traditional teachers.

Seventh-grader Manpreet Kaur says, "I've always liked science, but I think it gives me a little bit more knowledge, and I'm definitely more into it than I was before.



Because Holden's lab has room only for six middle-schoolers. Toomey and Holden looked for ways to expose the rest of his students to chemistry.

In the NSF grant, the pair noted they would develop modules to teach a chemistry unit to Toomey's seventh- and eight-graders.

The module includes an analogy comparing ice cream flavors to the periodic table, an introduction to the structure of molecules, compounds and atoms, and most notably, the chemistry of sugars and carbohydrates.

"We want to educate kids about making healthy choices so that when they're in whatever setting they're in, they'll use their chemistry knowledge to make healthy choices," says Toomey,
