K/1 will be going to the North American Bear Center in Ely. Be sure to pack a large lunch, lots of snacks, and a full water bottle. Children always seem to be extra hungry when on a field trip. Please remind your child that behavior expectations are high when out in the community and following directions is essential. We want everyone to have a safe and fun trip! When your child gets home, have them tell you what they learned about bears! Both Ms. Lizakowski and Ms. Klemmer will be going on the field trip and they are just as excited as the children!

2/5 will be going to the Wolf Ridge Environmental Learning Center with Ms. Sandefer, Mr. Kreider, Ms. Brown, and Mr. Maxwell. Students will leave Birch Grove at 10:15 on Monday morning and will return to school on Wednesday at 1:45. Be sure to send all of your child's gear with them to school on Monday for this 3 day trip. This trip is a part of the school program and behavior expectations are high. Please remind your child that following directions is expected of them. We want this to be a

safe and fun trip for all. If you have any questions about this trip, please give Ms. Sandefer a call. I look forward to hearing all of the stories the students will come back with!

The graduation ceremony will be held next week on Thursday starting at 10:30. Everyone is welcome to attend. After a short ceremony, parents and families are welcome to visit students' classrooms to take pictures. If you are taking your child home after the ceremony, please be sure to let your child's teacher know – this day gets a little crazy, and we want to be able to account for all of our students. Children remaining on site at 11:30 will go outside to eat their cold lunches. Buses will leave for routes home at 12:00 for an early release. This week I have finished up a grant request for a new program service for Birch Grove families, Literacy Enhancement and Retention Now (LEARN). Even if grant funds do not come through, I am excited to implement parts of this new program into the summer. LEARN will focus on enhancing reading skills for students that may need a boost to return to school in the fall at grade level. Each summer, many students back slide from where they are in June requiring some reteaching in the fall instead of moving forward. Paired with our excellent, literacy rich summer program LEARN will address any gaps in reading, math, and social skills. Keep an eye out for publications and advertisements as I get this program started!

One of the best ways to keep your child learning this summer is to keep the whole family reading and having meaningful conversations with each other. Coming home with the newsletter today is information on summer reading programs from Grand Marais and Silver Bay libraries, along with Arrowhead libraries mail a book program. There is also a design a library card contest and some other fun things that are happening out in your community this summer.
