Elijah (Liberia)

A few months ago a doctor in rural Liberia contacted LIMBS and told us about a patient who was in need of a prosthetic limb. Elijah is a 17-year-old boy from a remote region in Liberia who had an accident that caused a severe injury to his leg. The doctor did everything she could but an injection set in and in order to save Elijah's life and stop the infection she told the family that they needed to amputate his leg above the knee.

Elijah's father was very concerned about what kind of life his son would have with only one leg and refused the lifesaving

surgery. After many conversations between the doctor and the father, the doctor asked Elijah what he would like to do if his leg was healed. He said play soccer and go to school. The doctor told him that neither one of these things has to be completely closed off to him with an amputation and explained that people even play soccer with prosthetics. She showed him pictures of the Liberian amputee soccer team. He agreed to stay and have the surgery. He had the amputation and his leg healed well.

The problem was that the only prosthetic legs available in the country were old and very heavy. Fortunately, because of the efforts of your school LIMBS was able to provide a leg to Elijah at no cost! Elijah was fitted with his new LIMBS' leg and is now walking again and looking forward to returning to school and the soccer pitch.
