ut down the phone and strike up a conversation. Today's society seems to be driven wholly by social media networking. While this form of connection effectively unifies the entire world on a single platform, thereby aiding to diminish cultural barriers, we have begun to neglect the sense of camaraderie that arises from the regularity of standard, human interaction. 


