### **SPORTS NEWS**

The St. Louis Cardinals **5<sup>th</sup> Grade Black Team** remained perfect on the season by defeating the previously unbeaten St. Michael's Trojans 26-23 in a hard fought battle. The game was close throughout with the Cards leading 12-11 at halftime and 20-16 at the end of the 3<sup>rd</sup> qtr. Offensively, Andrew Oesterling lead the Cards with 10 points followed by Leyton Ratcliffe with 6 points. The entire team did a great job of breaking the press and playing aggressive defense.

The St. Louis **5<sup>th</sup> Grade Black Team** remains undefeated on the season by winning two games in this weekend's tournament. The Cardinals defeated St. Lawrence 23-14 in the first game to advance to the championship game. Andrew Oesterling had 12 points and Kurt Siefert 8 to pace the Cards.

In the Championship game, the Cards had a rematch with St. Michaels who they defeated earlier in the week by 3 points. The Cards had a slim 2 point lead at halftime 12-10 and outscored the Trojans 15-6 in the second half to post a 27-16 victory. The entire team played excellent defense and distributed the ball evenly on offense as six players ended up in the scoring column.

The St. Louis **5<sup>th</sup> grade black** team defeated the Greendale Bengals 34-18 to finish a perfect regular season at 7-0. The Cards played excellent defense and hustled up and down the floor to outpace the previously unbeaten Bengals. Offensively, Andrew Oesterling led all scorers with 17 points followed by Lleyton Ratcliffe 8 points, Nicholas Burlage 4, Will Freeland 3 and Max Giesting 2 points.

The St. Louis boys **6<sup>th</sup> grade** basketball team lost on the road to St. Michael's Thursday night by the score of 28-11. Adam Cox led the way for the Cardinals with 4 points. Others scoring were Zach Harmeyer, Evan Vogelsang, and Max Kirschner with 2 points apiece and Johnny Deal with 1 point. Jacob Deutsch played a great defensive game and was the leading rebounder for the team.

The St. Louis boys **6<sup>th</sup> grade** basketball team lost a pair of games in their tourney over the weekend. St. Lawrence defeated the Cardinals in the first game by the score of 34-9. Scoring for St. Louis were Zach Harmeyer, Eli Tuveson, Johnny Deal, and Adam Cox all with 2 points a piece and Adam Moster with 1 point. Jacob Deutsch lead the team in rebounding.

The Cardinals fell to St. Michael's in the consolation game in a close one by the score of 13-11. It was a total team effort as all of the players contributed in carrying out an up tempo strategy and did a great job of keeping it going throughout the entire game. The Cardinals fell behind early but outscored the Trojans 9-6 in the second half, coming up just short of the victory. Adam Cox led St. Louis with 3 points while Zach Harmeyer, Mason Enneking, Jacob Deutsch, and Johnny Deal contributed 2 points a piece.

St. Louis 5/6 grade will wrap up the season this Friday, December 20, when St. Paul visits the Activity Center 5th grade game starts at 5:30 pm.

The Saint Louis **7<sup>th</sup> Grade** Cardinals Basketball Team defeated South Dearborn Tuesday, Dec. 17 by the score of 29-12. The Cardinals were led in scoring by Robert Raver and Alex Geers. Gus Kellerman led the Cardinals in rebounds. The Cardinals got off to a quick start and a big lead. Charlie Prickel, Aidan Hornbach, and Ryan LaLoge made contributions and played significant minutes in the victory.

The St. Louis **8<sup>th</sup> grade** boys basketball team broke into the win column in a big way Tuesday night with a 48-14 win over South Dearborn's Blue team. The Cardinals jumped out to an early 10-3 lead, playing good defense and forcing many South Dearborn

turnovers. The lead increased to 26-8 by halftime. Stuart Lamping and Chandler Meyers paced the Cardinals with 13 points each. Jack Kellerman added 8 points and Kyle Siefert scored 6 points. Gavin Koester and Baird Tuveson contributed solid defensive play. St. Louis plays their final game before Christmas break on Thursday at South Ripley.

### Mother Seton

Elizabeth Ann Seton converted to Catholicism when her dear husband, William, died. Rejected by her Episcopalian family, and without support for her family, she welcomed the invitation to open a Catholic school for girls near Baltimore.



Leading a group of women in the spring of 1809, the community became the Sisters of St. Joseph and Elizabeth became Mother Seton. The number of sisters grew and so did their schools and orphanages marking the beginnings of the U.S. parochial school system.

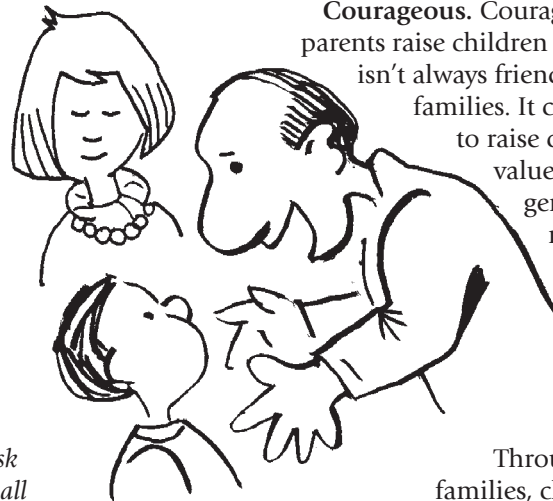

**Courageous.** Courage helps Catholic parents raise children in a society that isn't always friendly to religious families. It can take courage to raise children with values such as faith, generosity, and modesty. *"Say these things. Exhort and correct with all authority"* (Titus 2:15).

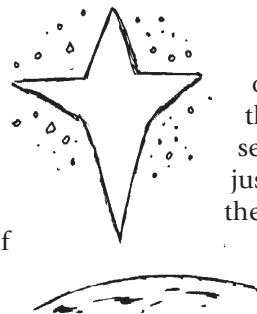
**More loving.** Through their families, children first learn about love. Demonstrate love daily in ways your children receive love. Confident of a parent's love, children then learn how to love God and others. *"Above all, let your love for one another be intense ..."* (1 Peter 4:8-9).

## Why do Catholics celebrate the Epiphany?

Epiphany is Greek for manifestation. The Feast of the Epiphany of Our Lord is the celebration of the visit of the wise men to the newborn Jesus. When they honored him, they bore witness to the fulfillment of God's promise of a savior.



This feast reminds us of our duty to adore our Lord through prayer, worship and self-sacrificing good work, just as the magi did when they traveled many miles to worship the infant who was God made flesh.

## Teach children to look for God

God is in the hearts of all who do good. Make a game out of looking for these signs of God's presence in the world...

**Acts of kindness and compassion.** Report when you "catch" strangers helping each other. God is behind all quiet deeds of charity.

**People of power or celebrity who make generous donations to the poor or dispossessed.** Watch or listen for news reports of prominent people making large donations to victims of misfortune. God is the inspiration for genuine philanthropy.



**Someone who won't compromise on his principles or morals - despite what the rest of society is doing.** There is much in the news about people who won't compromise their Christian principles. That's God working to reassert his just laws.

**Victims of tragedy who move from "Why did this happen?" to "What can I do now?"** Look for reports of those who do good from tragedies. Hope for the future comes from God.

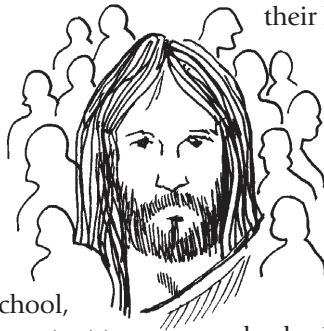
Jesus said, "I am with you always, until the end of the age" (Matthew 28:20).

### Scripture LESSON

**Matthew 4:12-23; Follow the leader.**

Almost every child has played some version of "Follow the Leader." In the game, players follow a "leader" wherever he goes and do whatever he does. We stomp through puddles, climb over fences, swing from trees, all to stay in the game.

We follow leaders in real life, too. There are leaders we may follow at school, in sports, at church. It is important to choose a leader who will lead us in the right direction. Then we have to decide how much of what a leader asks that we are willing to do.



Jesus chose twelve special men to be his closest followers and he became their leader. They went where he told them and did what he asked. Jesus is still calling people to follow him today. In fact, he has called each of us to follow him.

**What can a parent do?** Jesus is our true leader. We follow him before any other leader. Help children understand what it means to go where Jesus tells us and to do what he asks. The prize is worth it.

### Parent TALK

Now that she is 10 years old, it's time for me to stop solving my daughter's problems and let her advocate for herself.



Kara wears thick glasses and has always sat in the front row of classrooms to better see the board. This year her teacher placed her toward the back, saying that children with more pressing

problems needed the front-row spots. But that made it hard for Kara to see. When her grades started to drop, I almost called the teacher but decided to let Kara try instead.

We rehearsed a respectful conversation between Kara and her teacher and she went in the next day prepared. The teacher said she appreciated Kara's courtesy and together they chose a desk in the second row with an unobstructed view of the board.

Solving her own problem, Kara developed negotiating skills and confidence. That was better than any "fix" I could have made.

### Feasts & Celebrations

**January 1 – Solemnity of the Blessed Virgin Mary, the Holy Mother of God.** We honor Mary in her role as the Mother of Jesus, the Son of God.

**January 2 – St. Basil the Great (379).** St. Basil founded the first monastery in Asia Minor. He fought passionately to protect religious freedom and against the Arian heresy threatening the Church. He is best known as a skilled orator and tireless pastor.

**January 26 – Sts. Timothy and Titus (1st century).** Timothy was converted by St. Paul and became his

trusted friend. He was with Paul at the founding of the Church in Corinth. Titus, also a friend of Paul's, served the early Church as a peacemaker and as administrator to a community on the island of Crete.

**January 28 – St. Thomas Aquinas (1274).** Despite being imprisoned for a year by his mother to prevent his ordination, St. Thomas Aquinas became

one of the greatest theologians of the Church. His writings are still fundamental to Christian education today.

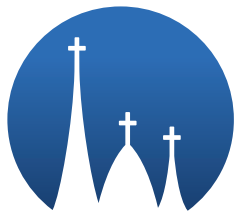
