
I hope you had a wonderful Spring Break and that conferences conducted prior to break provided you with helpful information.

# from the High School Principal, Holly Sample

This newsletter will arrive right after we have completed state testing in Mathematics, Reading and Writing. This year, instead of altering our schedule, students tested in their mathematics and English classes. All tests were computerized. This is a base-line year for the newly developed tests. Student scores will be broken into four levels (as the TCAP scores were) but now they are called: Distinguished Command, Strong Command, Moderate Command and Partial Command. The cut scores to determine each level will be established after all the tests are completed, so we will probably not get results from this round of testing for nine months.

Our students, for the most part, had wonderful attitudes and gave their best effort. We greeted them with breakfast as they returned from Spring Break and showed our appreciation with a "celebration slice" of pizza after most tests were completed on March 27. Senior project portfolios are due to advisors on April 10. The portfolio must be submitted in order for seniors to be scheduled for a board presentation. Seniors must score "Acceptable" or higher on their presentation to meet the senior project graduation requirement. Students who miss the boards due to unavoidable circumstances or who do not meet the standard will have an opportunity to make up the presentation at the end of April.





# ATTENTION: PARENTS OF 2015/16 HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

The State of Colorado has passed legislation to update school immunization requirements. These changes will impact students in high school for the 2015-2016 school year.

Currently students in grades K—7 have two valid doses of the Varicella (chicken pox) vaccine. Beginning July I, 2015 two (2) doses of Varicella (chicken pox) vaccine will be required for all students Kindergarten through 12th grade.

In a few weeks, you will receive a letter from the Health Office if your child's school immunization record indicates the need for a second dose of Varicella. Many physician offices have already been giving this vaccine. If your child has already had this immunization, please bring documentation to the Health Office.

This immunization can be obtained through your physician's office, other community providers and the Weld County Department of Public Health and Environment (Call 970-304-642 for clinic times and appointments).


