Dear University Schools' Families and Friends:

Happy Autumn!

As you may know, our school District is placing a mill levy override question on the November ballot. We have placed a fact sheet on the University website for your review. The fact sheet gives details about how the mill levy dollars will be allocated as well as general information.

Last May, a parent engagement survey, conducted by the Research Lab at the University of Northern Colorado, was distributed to parents. The results were compiled by UNC and sent to University Schools and the Board of Governors. We reviewed the comments and determined that most of the feedback was very positive, but there are some ways in which we can improve parent/teacher conferences; specifically at the secondary level.

After each conference window, parents will receive a feedback form asking if you need

further clarification from your teacher/advisor or other teachers. We hope this helps to improve the process so that our parent/teacher conferences provide the information you need about our students.

This past summer, we were able to continue using capital outlay dollars for improvements to our school. These improvements include:

28 flat panels (similar to Smart Boards) for our elementary classrooms

7 chrome labs for secondary departments and elementary grade levels

2 iPad labs for first and second grades Carpet for 22 classrooms

Concrete upgrades

New furniture for the parent/student waiting area in the main building

Welcome back to University High School. We have had a very positive start to the new school year. Student Leadership kicked off the school year with an interactive assembly that got students and faculty moving, talking and laughing together. In advising and other classes, teachers are focusing on building positive connections with and between students through conversations and activities.

As you know, our mission is to prepare students emotionally and academically for learning, leading and caring citizenship. Teachers at University High School have high expectations for students and engage them in challenging and relevant learning experiences. And, we know the old adage is true that "students don't care what you know until they know that you care."

Parents are key partners in this journey and I want to emphasize how important your involvement with school and your child's education is to his/her success. One way we encourage this partnership between home and school is through student-led conferences with parents and advisors at least twice each school year. Our goals for conferences are to empower students to develop a sense of independence and take responsibility for their own learning. Students share their progress toward academic and experiential graduation requirements and our hope is that parents and advisors will help them make plans to either continue

their success or make improvements where needed. The first conference window is September 21 until October 5.

This year, we will send out a brief survey after the conference window to ask for parent feedback about conference effectiveness and to give you a chance to ask additional questions from teachers if needed. While the Advisor is a key facilitator of communication, there is no need to "go through" the advisor or wait for conferences if you want to communicate with your child's teacher. Please feel free to reach out to teachers by phone or email at any time. We ask teachers to return messages within 24 hours.

We have several staff changes this school year. We welcome Ms. Rachel Brug who is teaching Visual Arts and Yearbook, Ms. Dana Kettlewell who is our new Instrumental Music teacher and new Mathematics teachers are Ms. Stephanie Wilhelm and Mr. Jonathan Hatfield. We have a new counselor, Melissa Stapleton, working with both elementary and high school students. Mr. Devin Moses has changed assignments from Social Studies to Visual Arts and Mr. Robert Kirby has been hired to teach Social Studies.

Our Fall activities and sports have gotten off to a great start and we have lots of school spirit. Homecoming week activities will begin October 3, culminating in the football game on Friday night, October 7, and the dance on Saturday night in the main gym. I hope you will take the opportunity to attend some of the upcoming school events. Thank you for choosing to be a part of the University Schools' Bulldog Family.

From the Middle School Principal, Paul Kirkpatrick

Going from 5th grade to 6th grade is quite a bit more involved than just going to a new building. This will be the first really big change since starting kindergarten. For some students who have been Bulldogs for years, the transition can still be daunting, not to mention for new middle school students to University from other schools. I will try to help you and your child prepare for what is ahead.

Most elementary students are used to the familiarity of their homeroom teacher and the comfort of their own classroom. Middle school days are full of changing classrooms, facing different teachers, lockers, etc. Expectations for organization and planning are stepped up and required to stay on top of the day I and day 2 routine. Any difficulties your child may have with simple organization will be compounded by more rigorous academic expectations.

Bringing in 6th graders before school starts has been very helpful for 'test runs' of the schedule, locating all of the rooms in the building, and for making some new friends. We spent several hours with advisors the first few days to go over routines, individual schedules, and practicing opening locker combinations to help students become comfortable with the new environment. The less anxious a student is about the basic operations of a day, allows them to focus more on the essentials of lessons.

Navigating the social aspects of middle school is a challenge in itself. Fifth graders are used to being the head of the pack

in elementary, and now they are the new, nervous, and youngest in the new fish pond. It is not at all uncommon to see new insecurities demonstrated. The biggest boy, is now the smallest in the group. The most popular girl is now an unknown among a new crowd. Believe it or not, all of these scenarios seem to level out very quickly - within days or weeks. Suddenly, new cliques of friends form, new best friendships happen, and once again; confidence soars!

We encourage all middle schoolers to participate in extracurricular activities. Sixth graders are already participating in cross country. Junior Bulldogs offers numerous choices of football, basketball, volleyball, etc., for students to play and enjoy friendly competition while learning basic skills. Seventh and eighth graders can play football, volleyball, cross country, basketball, wrestling, and track throughout the school year with our athletics program. In addition, we have excellent choir, band, and drama offerings, plus, Brain Bowl, Spelling Bee, Lego Robotics and several other high-interest club-like activities for all students.

Advisors will be your best contact to initiate conversations about opportunities and to ask specific questions. Your relationship with the advisor for three years will be most helpful to support the social and academic needs of your child. We look forward to working with you as partners in the growth and success of your student!

Elementary Essentials

From the Elementary Principal, Mike Mazurana

Welcome back! As we look forward to another great year at University Schools, it is important to take a look back at our school survey to see what we are doing well and what our community feels we could do to make US even better. If you have feedback on ways to improve or would like to tell people why you think University is great, our doors are always open or you can log on to www.greatschools.org to share your positive story.

Below are some of the findings from the 2016 Elementary School survey:

- K-5 parents on whether conferences accurately assessed the progress of their student: 89% agreed and strongly agreed with 8% having a neutral stance and only 3% feeling otherwise.
- K-5 parents on whether conferences were an effective use of their time: 87% agreed or strongly agreed. Neutral answers accounted for 10%, while only 3% felt like it was not a good use of their time.
- K-5 parents on whether the teacher communicates with them about their child's progress at least every few months or more: 88%
- K-5 parents when asked about whether they and their teacher work as a team to help their student grow and be successful: 91% felt this to be true.
- K-5 parents on whether the amount of homework was appropriate for their student: 88% felt that we had a good mixture of homework and classwork.
- K-5 parents on whether parents were

- aware of volunteer opportunities at our school: 81% either were volunteering or were aware of the opportunity to do so.
- K-5 parents on whether they felt valued by University Schools: 94% felt their role in their students' lives is valued by University Schools

Things we will continue to improve upon from parent feedback:

- Parent/teacher communication, before, during and after scheduled conferences
- Specific comments from specials for students who are above or below grade level expectations
- Strengthening the PLP process

As we sift through state results from our PARCC and CMAS scores for grades 3-5, our local data was again evaluated this year for areas of strength, need and overall percentile of students performing at grade level or above in STAR literacy (grades K-5) and math (grades 2-5). Below are some of the findings from the 2015-16 school year. To help you read it, fall would be the percent of students in the grade level who came into that grade level proficient or advanced according to STAR and spring would be the percentage that left the grade level proficient or advanced according to STAR.

Kindergarten: Literacy at or above grade level proficiency: Fall 2015 54% to spring 2016 87%

Ist Grade: Literacy at or above grade level proficiency: Fall 2015 37% to spring 2016 67%

2nd Grade: Literacy: Fall 44% to

spring 73% Math: Fall 58% to spring 84%

3rd Grade: Literacy: Fall 54% to spring 74% Math: Fall 70% to spring 77%

4th Grade: Literacy: Fall 70% to spring 85% Math: Fall 72% to spring 88%

5th Grade: Literacy: Fall 65% to spring 76% Math: Fall 79% to spring 78%

In conjunction with STAR we also give the DRA2 in grades I-3 to help us identify strengths and needs in literacy grade levels, classrooms and even individual students. Here are some of those findings:

- Ist grade teachers need to grow students at least 13 points from a 3-16 by the time they leave 1st grade to be on grade level. Their grade level average was 13.2 levels on average.
- 2nd grade teachers needed to grow their students from a 16-28 or 12 points for the year. 2nd grade grew 11.64 levels on average.

3rd grade needed to grow from a 28-38 or 10 points on average over the course of the year. 3rd grade grew 11.54 levels on average.






